Great Barrier Reef

Opera House

MARSUPIALS

- Australia has more than 140 species of marsupials, including kangaroos, wallabies, koalas, and wombats.

- Kangaroos and wallabies vary greatly in size and weight, ranging from half a kilogram to 90 kilograms.

- Estimates of Australia's kangaroo population vary between 30 and 60 million.

- Spot them in South Australia's Flinders Ranges, Tasmania's Freycinet National Park and in Namadgi and Kosciuszko National Parks in the Australian Alps.



BIRDS

• Of the 828 bird species listed in Australia, about half are found nowhere else. A vast array of waterbirds, seabirds and birds dwell in our open woodlands and forests.

• You can easily see penguins on Kangaroo Island in South Australia and Philip Island in Victoria.

• Kookaburras, best known for their hysterical, human-sounding laughter at dusk and dawn, are common, and you'll most likely spot (or hear) them in the countryside and often in city suburbs.

• Australia has more species of venomous snakes than any other continent, 21 of the world's 25 deadliest in fact. But not all are poisonous; we also have some stunning pythons and tree snakes.

• There are five species of endangered sea turtles which nest and lay eggs on certain beaches in season; and eight species of freshwater turtle.
