The coins are 1c, 2c, 5c, 10c, 20c, 50c, € 1 and 2 €.






2. In the Northern Ireland, the currency is the sterling pound.

#### **The Three Biggest Celebrations in Ireland**

•St. Patrick's Day: Named after Ireland's patron saint. Celebrates the country's rich culture and heritage with parades, dancing, music, food and plenty of pints of beer. What started as a one-day holiday on March 17.

•Christmas: Christmas in Ireland is a big celebration, lasting from about Dec. 24 to Jan. 6, though many count Dec. 8 as the official start of the season.

• Bloomsday: Honors James Joyce, one of Ireland's most famous literary masters. This event is held each year on June 16, the day in which Joyce's classic novel "Ulysses" takes place.



# **Christianity in Ireland**

Christianity is and has been the largest religion in Ireland. Most Christian churches are organised on an all-Ireland basis including both the **Republic of Ireland and Northern** Ireland,. The 84.2% of the population adheres to the Roman Catholic Church. In Northern Ireland, the various branches of Protestantism collectively form a majority of the population but the single largest church is the Roman **Catholic Church which accounts for** some 40.8% of the population.



# **Blarney Castle**

# **Bunratty Castle**

This fortress sits on Folk Park, an ancient Viking trading camp dating back to AD 970, just 7 miles from Shannon Airport in southwest Ireland. It is the fourth castle to be built onsite. Today, it's the best place in Ireland to enjoy a traditional medieval feast.

### **Doe Castle**

Doe Castle is in County Donegal in northwest Ireland. It's surrounded on 3 sides by water, and was built on a peninsula with a moat cleaved into the rock of the landward side. In short, Doe Castle looks like it's floating. While the interior isn't technically open to the public. It's one of Ireland's more rustic castles.
